Linnets are seed-eaters birds and considered as a resident and migrant species in Jordan. Adults of this species are characterized by the presence of a red color on the forehead and breasts. Several threats are affecting its population but mainly changes in agricultural practices, including the use of pesticides and fertilize are the main causes of its decline.



Partnership to Protect Nature

Believing in the importance of an alliance between the private sector and those in charge of environmental issues, The Royal Society for the Conservation of Nature strives to involve the private sector in conserving the environment. In this spirit, RSCN and Arab Bank have begun an ongoing collaboration towards building an enduring partnership.

After a fire broke out in Azraq Wetland Reserve in October 2009, RSCN's rehabilitation plans to rejuvenate the different habitats started with the Arab Bank voluntary action program. Staff from Arab Bank worked hand in hand with a team from Azraq to rehabilitate the wetlands by expanding the existing body of water, which is the original – and only – habitat in the world for the Azraq Killifish. The rehabilitation work also created a suitable environment for migratory birds and restored large parts of the wooden walking trail for tourists. Working together, with little time lost, Arab Bank and RSCN made sure the reserve was ready to open its gates and once again receive visitors.

When asked about what inspired Arab Bank's involvement, Executive Vice President Dina Shoman said, "Environmental protection and nature conservation is a subject that is dear to Arab Bank; we are committed to the environmental health of our community, and this aspect of the Together Program allows our employees to directly participate in the protection of Azraq Wetland Reserve." RSCN Director Yehya Khaled concurred, "Our partnership with Arab Bank has had a positive effect on protection programs in the reserves, especially in Azraq Wetland Reserve. We hope that this cooperation will be a stepping stone towards other such partnerships that will bring evermore support to the environment."
